Question & Answer (Q&A) Summary for "2024 Pre-Rulemaking Preview"

1. What is the deadline for submitting measures in CMS MUC Entry/Review Information Tool (MERIT)?

May 10, 2024 8:00 ET, which is a Friday. That deadline is set so that there is ample time for CMS review of the measure information, drafting of the Measures Under Consideration (MUC) List, and getting the MUC List through the federal clearance process in order to meet the December 1 statutory deadline.

2. When will the MERIT System Open for 2024 MUC measures?

This usually occurs at the end of January 2024, typically the last business day of the month.

3. How will I know when CMS MERIT is open for measure submissions?

We're aiming to have CMS MERIT open the last business day of January. When it's available for the 2024 cycle, we will send an announcement out to the pre-rulemaking email list and post an announcement on the MMS Hub.

4. Where is the pre-rulemaking calendar available? How many years in advance are calendars published?

Typically, the calendar is relatively stable, so you can use the slides from today's presentation as reference to the timeline or refer to the MMS Hub for pre-rulemaking updates and resources.

5. Is the information that I submit on CMS MERIT publicly accessible? Can anyone see it?

The measure information you input is viewable to anyone with a CMS MERIT account, and CMS MERIT accounts are granted to any party that requests one. So, yes, the information you submit in CMS MERIT is publicly accessible.

6. Can CMS describe how programs determine their measure needs and priorities?

It varies by program. Sometimes priorities are specified in program-specific statute, other measure priorities may "trickle down" from broader cross agency or agency-wide priorities (e.g., such as maternal health, health equity). Programs also use Meaningful Measures 2.0 and the Cascade of Meaningful Measures to identify priorities and gaps in their measure portfolios.

7. Can someone link the needs and priorities document?

The 2023 Program-Specific Needs and Priorities document is posted to the MMS Pre-Rulemaking Resources page, along with many other helpful documents and resources. The Needs and Priorities document is updated annually in the spring.

8. What is the impact on a measure submission for a survey-based measure if the tool has not been translated and validated in Spanish?

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CMS anticipates the measure steward to work with the respective programs and complete translation/validation before considering the measure in rulemaking.

10. Where are the value sets housed for these measures, specifically the newly released 2023 MUC metrics? I did not have luck finding them in VSAC [Value Set Authority Center]?

12. How do the 2024 updates specifically affect LTACHs?

Today we're discussing how measures for certain Medicare programs get submitted and selected for consideration. The updates discussed today (regarding timelines and changes to the questions on MERIT) are not specific to any one setting or program.
